7:30pm The Link Between Virtual Water & Food Security



Dr. Hans Schreier, UBC (see bio in Speakers' Bios & Abstracts)

Global food security is emerging as a new challenge; it's projected that we need to increase food production 50 percent over the next 30 years. This is a major challenge because 40 percent of all food is produced from 20 percent of the agricultural land that is irrigated. Increased climatic variability, new demands for water from urban expansion, and maintaining sufficient water in rivers for environmental services will make it difficult for agriculture to allocate more water to irrigation.

Canada is one of the few countries with the capacity to increase food exports to the world. If we step up to the plate, the water used to grow exported crops will no longer be available for other uses.

This means we are exporting virtual water. Virtual water is the amount of water needed to produce the crop; countries that import food therefore import virtual water to release the pressure on scarce domestic water sources. For example, the country of Jordan imports four times as much water imbedded in food as all the freshwater resources available in the country. If they had to grow all their food locally, they wouldn't have sufficient water for domestic purposes. As countries become water short, they have the option of importing water-intensive food.

The water imbedded in food that is exported will likely become a major issue in the drier Canadian watersheds such as the Okanagan in BC and the South Saskatchewan River in Alberta. There are a number of options available: we can improve irrigation efficiency, grow water-efficient crops, and/or change our diets to reduce water demand. For example, our current daily diet requires about 5,000L of water to produce. We can reduce these water demands by eating healthier and less water-demanding foods.

Dr. Schreier's presentation will show what the water demands are for all types of food grown globally and in the Okanagan and South Saskatchewan River watersheds, and what this means in terms of long-term water supplies and demands. Intensive livestock production is by far the most water consumptive and water polluting agricultural activity, and suggestions will be made to show which crops have the highest value and use the least amount of water. The key message is that in water stressed regions, exporting water intensive food is not a sustainable option.
